741-X-4-01.01

Investigator Apprentice -- 34-25B-12.1

1. An individual may obtain a license as a private investigator apprentice while working under the supervision of a licensed private investigator.
2. An apprentice license must be 18 years of age.
3. A high school graduate who has earned a GED certificate or has completed other equivalent education as determined suitable by the Board.
4. Meet all requirements of subdivision (2) through (5), inclusive, of Section 34-25B-12.1
5. Once the application is received by the board from the apprentice, a thirty-day waiting period will begin before the apprentice is eligible to sit for the Alabama Private Investigators Apprentice examination.
6. The board will require the apprentice applicant to take the apprentice examination not less than 120 days after the initial application, but not mandate to take it before the first 45 days. The application for an apprentice licensee can be taken anytime, however, it must be done in the first 120 days to complete the apprentice examination.
7. The apprentice will complete 40 hours of classroom training fundamentals determined by the Board, and 260 field hours to be qualified for licensure.
